9) Contact with potential or confirmed coronavirus cases	H	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Pupils, staff and other adults do not enter the school premises if: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. They have any symptoms of coronavirus. b. They have tested positive for coronavirus in the last 10 days. c. They are required to quarantine having recently visited countries outside the Common Travel Area. b) Parents are informed via letter not to bring their children onto the school premises if they show symptoms of, or have tested positive for, coronavirus. c) Staff are informed of the symptoms of possible coronavirus infection, e.g. a cough, loss or change in sense of smell or taste, and a high temperature, and are kept up-to-date with national guidance about the signs, symptoms and transmission of coronavirus. d) Staff, parents, pupils and visitors are informed of the national legal requirements regarding self-isolation, including that if they are required to self-isolate, this must be for a full 10 days from the start of their symptoms, or the date of their positive test if they did not have symptoms. e) Pupils and parents are made aware that pupils under the age of 18 are no longer required to self-isolate if they are identified as a close contact of a positive case. Instead, pupils will be advised by NHS Test and Trace to take a PCR test and will only need to isolate if they produce a positive test. f) Pupils and parents are made aware that fully vaccinated adults who are identified as a close contact of a positive case do not need to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms or produce a positive test, as long as they are fully vaccinated. g) Staff who have only had one dose of the vaccine are made aware that they still need to self-isolate if identified as a close contact until two weeks after receiving their second dose. h) Instances of staff, pupils, visitors and volunteers displaying symptoms of coronavirus are managed in line with local and national guidance. 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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> i) Pupils and parents are made aware that staff and students over the age of 18 should follow the same self-isolation rules as those under 18 until four months after their 18th birthday, at which point they will begin to follow the same rules as adults. This time should be used to ensure they are vaccinated if possible. j) If anyone in the school develops coronavirus symptoms while at school, they are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Sent home to begin isolation – the isolation period includes the day the symptoms started and the next 10 full days. b. Advised to follow the guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus infection. c. Advised to arrange a PCR test as soon as possible. k) Pupils being sent home after displaying symptoms who are awaiting collection by a parent are moved to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, with an open window for ventilation where possible. If it is not possible to isolate the pupil, they are moved to an area which is at least two metres away from others. If required, a member of staff supervises the pupil. l) Where contact with a pupil’s parents cannot be made, appropriate procedures are followed in accordance with those outlined in government guidance. m) In exceptional circumstances, where a pupil’s parents cannot arrange to have their child collected, if it is age-appropriate and safe to do so, the child is directed to walk, cycle or scoot home. If this is not possible, the school makes alternative arrangements. n) Symptomatic individuals who are sent home are directed to not use public transport to get home. o) If the pupil needs to use the toilet while awaiting collection, they use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom is cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else. p) Emergency assistance is called immediately if the pupil’s symptoms worsen and they require further medical care. q) PPE is worn by supervising staff if direct personal care is needed and they cannot maintain a distance of two metres. r) Anyone who comes into contact with a symptomatic individual washes their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running warm water or hand sanitiser. The area around the symptomatic individual is cleaned with normal household bleach after they have left the premises. s) Staff members who have helped someone with symptoms and any pupils who have been in close contact with them are informed that they do not need to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves. t) The school refuses to admit a pupil who is displaying symptoms of coronavirus where their parents are insisting their child attends if, in its reasonable judgement, the pupil poses a risk of infection to other members of the school community. 				

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10) Face coverings	L	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Staff, pupils and visitors are informed via letter/email that face coverings are not mandatory but can be worn if chosen by the individual. b) In the event of a school or local outbreak, the school adheres to advice from a director of health that may include bringing back face coverings temporarily in communal areas and classrooms for staff, pupils and visitors. c) In the event that the school must return to using face coverings, the school remains sensitive to the fact that some people are less able to wear face coverings and that the reasons for this may not be visible to others. d) Transparent face coverings, which may assist communication with someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expressions to communicate, are worn where appropriate. e) Face visors or shields are not worn as an equivalent alternative to face coverings; however, they can be worn by those exempt from wearing face coverings. f) Face visors or shields are only used after carrying out a risk assessment for the specific situation and always be cleaned appropriately. g) Individuals are provided with clear instructions on how to put on, remove, store and dispose of face coverings. This includes instructions to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Clean hands before and after touching a face covering. b. Store face coverings in individual, sealable plastic bags. c. Avoid wearing damp face coverings. h) Where face coverings are required, individuals are not prevented from entering or attending school on the grounds that they are not wearing a face covering. i) The school has a contingency supply of face coverings. j) Anyone struggling to access a face covering, or unable to use their face covering because it has been forgotten or soiled, is provided with one from the school's contingency supply. k) Face coverings should be worn in enclosed and crowded places – this includes on school transport. 11) PPE	M	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) PPE is distributed to staff who provide intimate care for pupils and for cases where a pupil becomes unwell with symptoms of coronavirus whilst in school and a distance of two metres cannot be maintained. b) Additional risk assessments are conducted on a case-by-case basis to determine whether staff require PPE to carry out other tasks and duties. c) When working with pupils who cough, spit or vomit but do not have coronavirus symptoms, staff only wear PPE that would routinely be worn. d) Used PPE is disposed of properly using bins provided around the school. Staff and pupils are told not to use recycling bins for the disposing of PPE. e) All PPE waste is put in a plastic rubbish bag which, once full, is tied and placed in a second tied bag and stored in a suitable and secure place, marked for storage for 72 hours. 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12) Hand cleaning and respiratory hygiene	M	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Staff, pupils, visitors and contractors are informed via letter that enhanced hygiene practices are in place. b) Suitable handwashing facilities are provided for individuals to wash their hands regularly and at the following intervals: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Arrival at school b. Return from breaks c. A change in rooms d. Before and after eating c) The school considers how often pupils and staff need to wash their hands and time for this is incorporated into timetables and lesson plans, allowing for additional opportunities for some staff and pupils to wash their hands more frequently, e.g. pupils who use saliva as a sensory stimulant. d) There is an adequate amount of handwashing stations, which are kept well-supplied with soap and running water or hand sanitiser. e) Adequate amounts of tissues and bins are available in the relevant areas. f) Skin-friendly sanitising wipes are used as an alternative for pupils who are at risk of ingesting hand sanitiser, where appropriate. g) Visual aids are displayed throughout the school reminding pupils to wash their hands regularly and follow the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach. h) A plan is created to assimilate the hand-washing routine and 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach into school culture, supplemented by behaviour expectations and communication around the importance of the measures. i) Pupils are supervised, where appropriate, when using hand sanitiser to ensure they do not ingest any. j) Pupils are instructed to cough or sneeze into their inner elbow and use a tissue to cover their mouths and noses where possible, disposing of the tissue in lidded bins. k) Pupils wash their hands after they have coughed or sneezed. l) Pupils with complex needs are supported to ensure they adopt good hand cleaning and respiratory hygiene practices. m) Individual risk assessments are conducted for pupils with complex needs who struggle to maintain good respiratory hygiene. More frequent cleaning of rooms and shared areas (including classrooms, playgrounds and eating areas) that are used by different groups. b. Individuals not undergoing testing attend school in line with normal school arrangements. c) Staff are encouraged to test twice weekly at home until the testing guidance is reviewed in September. d) The school obtains written consent from staff to process and store their testing data prior to beginning testing. e) All pupils are strongly encouraged to receive two on-site lateral flow device (LFD) tests, three to five days apart, on their return to school in the Autumn term. f) The school obtains written consent from pupils, and their parents where required, to process and store their testing data prior to beginning testing. g) Individuals with negative test results continue to attend school unless they have been advised by NHS Test and Trace or another health professional to stay at home. h) Staff and pupils undergoing testing are supplied with LFD test kits to self-swab and test themselves twice a week at home. i) Staff, pupils and parents are fully informed of the testing programme. 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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> j) Individuals report their results to NHS Test and Trace as soon as the test is completed, either online or by telephone. k) Individuals who receive a positive result from an LFD test complete a 10-day period of self-isolation and are asked to arrange a confirmatory PCR test. l) Individuals who test positive using an LFD test arrange their PCR test within 2 days of the positive result. All positive results from LFD tests, whether conducted at home or at school, are confirmed with a PCR test. m) Staff, pupils and parents are made aware that negative results from confirmatory PCR tests taken within 2 days of LFD tests override positive results from LFD tests; therefore, individuals who receive negative PCR test results can return to school, provided they do not have symptoms. n) Individuals do not take an LFD test if they have tested positive for coronavirus within the last 90 days. o) Individuals are informed that LFD tests are not to be used if they begin to develop symptoms of coronavirus; they instead begin self-isolating immediately and book a PCR test. p) Testing kits are stored indoors between a temperature of 2 to 30°C. q) Individuals are instructed to collect test kits from the designated collection point. r) A test kit log is in use and kept up-to-date with the relevant information required. s) A test result log is in use and kept up-to-date with the relevant information required. t) The data held in the test kit log and test result log is stored in line with the school's <u>Data Protection Policy</u> at all times. 				
17) NHS Test and trace	L	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) The school makes staff aware that is not responsible for Test and Trace contacting. This will be taken over by the NHS Test and Trace service. b) The school makes staff aware that the NHS Test and Trace service will inform staff and pupils if they have been in close contact with a positive case of coronavirus and will advise them to take a PCR test. c) The school continues to work with local HPTs in the event of a school or local outbreak. d) Staff members and parents are informed that they will need to engage with the NHS Test and Trace programme if they are contacted, meaning they need to be ready and willing to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Book a PCR test if they (or their child) display symptoms. b. Provide details of anyone they (or their child) have been in close contact with if they were to test positive for coronavirus or are asked by NHS Test and Trace. c. Take a test if they have been in close contact with someone who develops coronavirus symptoms or someone who tests positive. d. Self-isolate if they display symptoms or produce a positive test. e) Anyone in school who displays symptoms is encouraged to get a PCR test. f) If the school believes a symptomatic individual may face barriers to accessing a PCR test elsewhere, the school provides them with a PCR test. g) PCR tests stored on the school site are stored securely at ambient room temperature (5 to 22°C). Other members of their household are required to continue self-isolating for the full 10-day period unless they are fully vaccinated adults or under the age of 18. n) Individuals are informed that, if they receive notification via the NHS Test and Trace app that they have been in close contact with a positive case, they must inform the school immediately. o) Individuals who test positive are encouraged to report the result on the NHS Test and Trace app. p) If a pupil receives notification to self-isolate, the school ensures appropriate arrangements are in place for the pupil to self-isolate when they are directed to, and begin remote learning. q) If a member of staff receives notification that they need to self-isolate, the school will consider the action that needs to be taken to ensure continuity of education. r) Individuals are made aware that they are not required to self-isolate if they live in the same household or are a close contact of someone with coronavirus, and any of the following apply: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> s) They are fully vaccinated. t) They are below the age of 18 years and 6 months. u) They have taken part in or are currently part of an approved vaccine trial. v) They are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons. w) Pupils under 18 and 6 months that have been identified as a close contact are made aware that they should continue to attend school as normal. 				
18) Confirmed cases of coronavirus		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Parents are informed, via letter, of how the school responds to confirmed cases of coronavirus. b) Where an individual in the school community tests positive for coronavirus, the school follows public health advice and the headteacher contacts the DfE's dedicated advice service immediately. c) The school works with the DfE's dedicated coronavirus advice service (or local HPT if the case is escalated) to carry out a rapid risk assessment and identify appropriate next steps. d) Household members of individuals who develop symptoms or test positive also begin self-isolating, starting from the day the individual's symptoms started, or the day of their positive test result if asymptomatic, and continue to self-isolate for the next full 10 days. e) Household members of close contacts of positive or symptomatic individuals do not self-isolate unless they, or the close contact, develop symptoms or test positive.
